I had the honor of attending a Strike Out Polio event in July at PNC Park, home of the Pittsburgh Pirates MLB team. The Rotary Club of Delmont-Salem hosted the event, which raised \$1.3 million for PolioPlus

Later in the summer, I joined members of our Rotary family in supporting the Más Millas Menos Polio (More Miles Less Polio) bike ride. Felipe Meza Chávez and his team rode all the way from Ciudad Juárez, Mexico, to One Rotary Center in Evanston, Illinois, to raise money and awareness. The ride took 12 days, and Felipe and his team collected more than \$100,000 to support the fight against polio. It was a joy to greet them as they arrived in Evanston.

And I was thrilled to see Team End Polio raise global awareness around the 2024 Paris Olympics. This world-class roster of athletes, global leaders, and polio eradication supporters came together to advocate for a world where no child has to live in fear of being paralyzed by polio. I knew Aidan and worked with him directly. He was a tireless advocate in the fight against police and a kind, genuine man. We will remember him both for his advocacy and his warmth

But where there is hardship, there is also hope. I feel hopeful whenever I consider the countless ways Rotary supports the fight every day to eradicate polio.

He graduated in Commerce from University of Delhi. Professionally he is into Exhibitions – His firm "Different Dimensions" designs and fabricates booths for exhibitors world over, mainly in Europe, USA, Middle East and Far East and this keeps him away from India for more than 5 months in a year.

He was a "Lion" for 3 years before joining Rotary in 1997and has been taking care of "New Generation Wing" ever since. Charter President of Rotary Club of Delhi Akash has always been closely associated with Interacts and Rotaracts – the youth wing of Rotary. He has been President twice in year 2003-04 and 2014-15. Has held several positions in District from time to time. Currently holding the position of Dist Co-Chair New Generation and Director New Generations in Rotary Club of Delhi Akash Megapolis (Club Delhi Akash merged with Megapolis couple of years back)

He did his schooling from St. Xavier's School, New Delhi and completed his Bachelor Degree in Architecture from the School of Planning & Architecture, New Delhi. He specialised in energy efficient Architecture and has won many design competitions in low-cost housing, innovations in housings and solar passive buildings.

Ravi is married to Jyotsana and they forayed into landscaping in 2004. They started a Landscape vertical named Rocks n Roots and started the first Garden Boutique spread over 3000 Sq.Ft. With the grace of the Almighty, we did Aralias and Magnolia for DLF and were associated with development and maintenance of Landscape for real estate developers like Unitech, Emmar, MGF, Ansal to name a few. We had the opportunity to place the first plant when GMR started operations in Delhi and have developed landscape for Delhi Airport T3, Road leading to the Airport, Multi-Level Car Parking and are now involved with the landscape of the new Terminal 1.

Rocks n Roots was selected as specialised vendor to procure plants from all over India and abroad for the Terminal 2, Bengaluru Airport. We transplanted over 3000 trees, developed the landscape of the forest belt and set up the indoor planation. The project has been awarded as the most beautiful airport in the world by UNESCO.

Ravi & Jyotsna have been active in Rotary since 1994. Ravi was President in the Rotary year 2000-01 & was actively involved with Rotary at the District level having served the District as Assistant Governor and District Secretary Administration.


Stall of Smart Thinkers bagged the second position among the top 100 stalls in the premises of IIT Delhi.

plant Watering tips

According to the Season:

There are two ways to kill a plant, either we over water it showing our love for plants or we let the soil go bone dry.

The water scheduling is daily in the morning hours during summer. And every third day during winters. The checking technique is to put your hand into the soil. If it's dry then do your watering. But if it's still moist leave the watering for another day. We need to just about give enough water. Don't overdo it. An important tip for winter grass watering is the washing of grass in the early hours as the morning dew which we romanticize is actually acid rain and can make our grass turn yellow. Wash it away before 9 am.
